1. Why do you want to be on the Board of Education and what has been your past involvement in our schools?

I want to serve on the board to support the deliberate learning environment for students of our district. Our two daughters thrived in this educational environment, both were admitted to highly selective colleges (United States Air Force Academy and University of Chicago). The support of teachers and administrators contributed to this success. I am encouraged by the update of the local curriculum and the deliberate and systematic Professional Development the district is recently adopting through the Kansas Education Systems Accreditation (KESA) process, and I seek to be a part of this change. I have been an involved parent and I have observed the process and decisions made in USD 469 since 2005. My involvement has included: LES Site Council from 2005 to 2012, Room Parent, Field Trip Chaperone, Field Day volunteer, paraprofessional, substitute teacher, Future Cities volunteer, Model United Nations Judge, Cross Country Parent, Band Parent, Speech & Debate Judge and Hospitality Host, Scholars Bowl Judge, Operation Graduation Committee 2018 and 2020, LHS Site Council 2016-2020, District Site Council 2020.

2. What role does the board have in supervising improvements in curriculum and instruction?

The role the board has in supervising improvements is to select an innovative superintendent and trust that individual to carry out the authority legally granted to that position by the board, state and federal levels to provide excellent education. The board should support the superintendent in choosing exceptional educators to form a strong faculty. With this delegated responsibility, the board should expect selected professional staff to facilitate, develop and implement interlinked and nested curriculum and instruction that advances concepts from kindergarten through 12th grade. The board should provide resources necessary to carry out district vision. KESA has a direct impact on improving curriculum and instruction through a comprehensive model that is synchronizing the professional efforts of our district. The board should request to be kept apprised of the KESA process at regular intervals, offering support and assistance of resources necessary to reach and sustain accreditation objectives and, ultimately, student achievement.

3. In your opinion, how much involvement should the board have in the preparation of budget priorities?

In preparing budget priorities, the involvement of the board should reflect school policies and meet legal requirements. Additionally, transparency and collaboration of the many stakeholders

in a district and the community is imperative. The board should receive monthly budget reviews. The board must work professionally with the superintendent to establish priorities and fully understand the allocation of funds as it relates to student achievement. The board has a trusted role to demonstrate good stewardship of fiscal resources of the community and simultaneously support the superintendent.

4. Do you think boards of education should evaluate their performance annually and set district goals? Why or why not?

Yes. It is integral for an effective organization to have a feedback loop. The process of Goal-setting, Performance (executing the business of the board) measurement and Evaluation provides the opportunity for critical thinking, creative problem solving and reflection upon the decision-making process and the resulting impact. Annual performance evaluation should include candor and professionalism to hold the board accountable for accomplishing district goals in support of the vision of student achievement. Criteria should be determined through measurable objectives clearly defined and published early in the year - these are targets and quantifiable milestones for the strategic focus of the board to strive to achieve. For example, I have discerned that there could be more of a linkage between the site councils of each building and the district site council. I was pleased to learn that KESA considers this in its compilation of information. Site Councils should, by design, be familiar with the function of their building's leadership team, for it impacts the educational environment. This is just one facet of how the board could evaluate its performance, by perhaps widening the breadth of knowledge and interrelation and measurement among so many various groups doing great things across our district.

5. Should the board have any day-to-day involvement in the operation of the schools? Explain.

The primary day-to-day involvement of the board should be to serve as a positive delegation promoting and advocating for excellence in education for the students of this district. Day-to-day involvement of the board could best be represented by carefully crafted district policy with strategic vision that sets the superintendent, administrators, educators, students, parents and other stakeholders up for success - and allows them to do their jobs and inspire learners to become leaders. During this current COVID-19 crisis, I am incredibly proud of the rapid communication that the district has enacted as we attempt to mitigate the virus spread. Governor Kelly boldly announced the closing of Kansas school buildings under these unprecedented circumstances, and USD469 is rolling out the continuous learning and meeting the needs of our students with agility and professionalism. As a parent of a current high school senior in our home, emotions run the gamut over this. In recent years, much of her coursework had been online delivery or at least submission, so I observe that our district students and staff are more prepared than many with this instant change from physical school to virtual school.
