Welcome to the 2021-2022 school year! We are thrilled to welcome our returning Lansing USD 469 families as well as those new to our district. It has been an honor and pleasure to have been a part of the Lansing School District over the past 26 years, having served as teacher, building administrator, district administrator, and now starting my second year as Superintendent.

I believe family engagement in student learning is imperative to student success, and last year put that premise to the test. Looking back on the 2020-2021 school year and the challenges presented not only to our district but those across the country, I am proud of the way our school community and parents built a partnership for the betterment of the students in Lansing USD 469. We have overcome unprecedented adversity and have emerged stronger as a result.

Student success will remain at the forefront of Lansing USD 469's priorities for the upcoming school year. We will maintain the Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) district-wide for students who are struggling academically. All students will be screened in reading and math during the first few weeks of school using FASTBRIDGE. These scores will be used to identify students who are likely to struggle academically, and we will use MTSS to rapidly aid students predicted not to meet their grade-level benchmark. The Lansing USD 469 Board of Education passed a district-wide Thursday late start schedule starting this school year to give our teachers ample time to collaborate to improve the MTSS process and student success. Busses will run one hour later each Thursday across our district. We offer free childcare for elementary and intermediate students (grades K - 5) through YMCA for parents needing to drop their students off at 8:00 am. The late start schedule will not occur during any week that consists of three school days or less.

Another change we are implementing this year is the addition of the Lansing USD 469 Greenbush Virtual Academy. Students accepted into the virtual school option will have a certified teacher through Greenbush and will be eligible for extracurricular activities through our district. Interested families should visit our website (<u>www.usd469.net</u>) for more information on how to start the enrollment process. We are also happy to share that USDA has extended free meals to students through the summer of 2022. There is no need to sign up – each child is eligible and will receive free meals this school year.



The Lansing USD 469 Board of Education voted on and approved a new **Transportation Proposal** for the 2021-2022 school year during their April board meeting. The new policy is being put into place to increase the safety for our bus riders, make the beginning of the school year bus schedules more efficient, and allow for better communication between parents and school staff pertaining to transportation.

If you have not done it yet, you will register for bussing outside of the Skyward registration through the following link: <u>CLICK HERE TO REGISTER FOR BUSSING</u>

There is a \$35 household registration fee for families eligible to ride the bus. Free & reduced students who are eligible for transportation will ride free. Students will be assigned an RFID card which will be located and kept on the student's bus. Transportation is based on the student's home address on Skyward.

If you have previously filled out the form, you do not need to do it again. To see your student's bus number of pickup / drop office times, check your Skyward Family Access page. If you have questions, contact Janine Shields at **913-250-0749**.

The Kansas Department of Education provides transportation for students who reside 2.5 miles from their attendance center.

SAFE WALKING ZONES

Lansing School District has walking zones designated around each attendance center. Each Student Walking Zone will be drawn so that students will be eligible for school district transportation if walking to their school would result in students walking across or along Highway 7, DeSoto Road, 4H Road, and 147th Street. Students residing in a student walking zone for their school and nonresident students will **not** be transported.

Transportation Safety

Whether children walk, ride their bicycle or take the bus to school, it is extremely important that they take proper safety precautions. Here are some tips to make sure your child safely travels to school:

Walking to school

Review your family's walking safety rules and practice walking to school with your child

- Walk on the sidewalk, if one is available; when on a street with no sidewalk, walk facing the traffic
- Before you cross the street, stop and look left, right and left again to see if cars are coming
- Make eye contact with drivers before crossing and always cross streets at crosswalks or intersections
- O Stay alert and avoid distracted walking

Riding a bicycle to school

Teach your child the rules of the road and practice riding the bike route to school with your child

- Ride on the right side of the road, with traffic, and in single file
- Come to a complete stop before crossing the street; walk bikes across the street
- O Stay alert and avoid distracted riding
- Make sure your child always wears a properly fitted helmet and bright clothing

Riding the bus to school

Teach your children school bus safety rules and practice with them

- Go to the bus stop with your child to teach them the proper way to get on and off the bus
- Teach your children to stand six feet (or 3 giant steps) away from the curb
- If your child must cross the street in front of the bus, teach him or her to walk on the side of the road until they are 10 feet ahead of the bus; your child and the bus driver should always be able to see each other



Driving your child to school Stay alert and avoid distracted driving

- Obey school zone speed limits and follow your school's drop-off procedure
- Make eye contact with children who are crossing the street

School Safety

Many school-related injuries are completely preventable. Follow these steps to ensure your child's safety at school:

Preventing backpack-related injuries

Choose a backpack for your child carefully; it should have ergonomically designed features to enhance safety and comfort

- Ask your child to use both straps when wearing their backpack to evenly distribute the weight on their shoulders
- Don't overstuff a backpack; it should weigh no more than 5 to 10 percent of your child's body weight
- Rolling backpacks should be used cautiously since they can create a trip hazard in crowded school hallways

Preventing playground-related injuries

To reduce strangulation hazards on playgrounds, have your child leave necklaces and jackets with drawstrings at home

Immunization Requirements for the 2021 - 2022 School Year

K.A.R. 28-1-20 defines immunizations required for any individual who attends school or a childcare program operated by a school. Below are the requirements for the indicated school year. Please carefully review the requirements. The usual number of doses required are listed; however there are exceptional circumstances that could alter the number of doses a child needs. If you have questions about your child's immunization status, contact your child's primary care provider or local health department.



Proof of receiving the required immunizations must be provided to the school prior to the student attending the first day of school.

Drug Free Schools and Workplace
