WHAT IS FENTANYL?

Fentanyl is a synthetic opioid that is at least 50 MORE POTENT THAN HEROIN

INTENTIONAL USE

- Fentanyl is prescribed by doctors for severe pain especially after surgery
- Some people use it to get high because of its potency
- Just a few grains of fentanyl can cause an overdose

UNINTENTIONAL USE

- Many people are exposed to fentanyl without knowing
- Illegal labs can make fentanyl very cheaply
- Drug dealers mix fentanyl with other drugs to boost their potency and make more money

Many fake pills are made to look like prescription opioids such as oxycodone (Oxycontin®, Percocet®), hydrocodone (Vicodin®), and alprazolam (Xanax®); or stimulants like amphetamines (Adderall®).

WHAT IS FENTANYL?

- Fentanyl is prescribed by doctors to treat severe pain -- especially after surgery. It is called a synthetic (artificial) opioid.
- Fentanyl can be made by illegal drug makers and costs less than other drugs to make.
- Drug dealers mix fentanyl in with other drugs to make them more potent, but they don't regulate the amount.
- A few grains of fentanyl is enough to cause an overdose and death.

The small amount of fentanyl shown inside the circle is enough to cause an overdose.
